Evaluating Research in Academic Journal

Knowing the potential components of an academic journal will help you to determine which articles are research articles, and which are not, despite appearing in an academic journal. Note:even within a peer-reviewed publication, not all of these components are necessarily subject to the peer-review process. You will need to read a specific publication's editorial policies to determine whether their letters to the editor, book reviews, and news briefs are peer-reviewed prior to publication, or ...

Academic Journals - Evaluating and Citing Sources ...

Scholarly Journals contain articles describing high quality research that has been reviewed by experts in the field prior to publication. Trade magazines may be useful for topics in business or where economic data is needed. There are also good for learning what the current "hot topics" are in an area.

How to Evaluate Journal Articles - How to Do Library ...

Scholarly journals are written by academics for academics. They are generally focused on a specific academic field or discipline. Their purpose is to advance scholarship in that field by publishing in-depth research studies. Most scholarly journals are also peer reviewed.

Most of the time news sources are not as credible as academic journals, and newspapers range in credibility from paper to paper. (The URL will usually include .com.) Evaluating Sources - the CRAAP Test / Academic Peer Review ...

Look for articles published in scholarly journals or sources that require certain standards or criteria be met before publication. Look for materials at Web sites that focus on scholarly resources (e.g. Google Scholar) Compare several opinions by scholars in your topic field, which is another way to verify or evaluate your sources.

A very different approach known as Social Impact Assessment Methods for research and funding instruments through the study of Productive Interactions (SIAMPI) was developed from the Dutch project Evaluating Research in Context and has a central theme of capturing "productive interactions" between researchers and stakeholders by analysing the networks that evolve during research programmes (Spaapen and Drooge, 2011; Spaapen et al. n.d.).
