Context Mentoring, as a partnership in personal and professional growth and development, is central to academic medicine, but it is challenged by increased clinical, administrative, research, and other educational demands on medical faculty. Therefore, evidence for the value of mentoring needs to be evaluated. Objective To systematically review the evidence about the prevalence of mentorship and its relationship to career development.

Mentoring in Academic Medicine: A Systematic Review ...

The prevalence of mentoring in academic medicine varies: Between 19% and 84% of clinical faculty members reported currently working with a mentor in a recent review. 2 A review of the literature from 1966 through 2002 that describes mentoring programs for medical students and doctors suggests that mentoring becomes less common once formal training is complete. 3 Just 3 of the 16 articles identified in that review, now over a decade old, describe mentoring programs for physicians out of training.

For example, the flipped classroom and social media for learning are growing within medical education.³¹The key to enhancing student engagement may be in learning from millennials and gaining skills from early career staff.
